She was known for her tireless dedication to underserved communities, and for her commitment to ensure a high- quality

education for all students.

She joined the Challenge Team in 2000, when she became principal of Graham Middle School. Upon retiring, she rejoined Challenge Team, and has been an active member of the Summer Learning Initiative.

Officer Robert Taylor, or Bobby T as he is affectionately known throughout the Mountain View Police Department, has been a well-known figure for the past two decades. A stand-out school resource officer, Taylor's easy-going personality makes him a favorite mentor and confidante of many students.
