TERMINOLOGY



Missing child is a minor (under 18) whose whereabouts are unknown to their parent, legal guardian, or other person with parental rights over the child. 911 should be called immediately and a missing child report filed.

Child sex trafficking, also known as CSEC, the commercial sexual exploitation of children, refers to commercial sex acts involving youth and children under the age of 18. Unlike with adults, there is no need for force, fraud or coercion to be involved for the child to be considered a trafficking victim.

Commercial sex acts includes prostitution, pornography and sexual performance done in exchange for any item of value, such as money, drugs shelter, food or clothes.



Hundreds of thousands of children are reported missing every year in the United States and millions more are exploited online. It's happening in plain sight, infiltrating every county and every zip code, from the wealthy to the poor.

Not enough is being done to find and protect these vulnerable children. Those who are recovered often lack the support they need to fully heal and thrive.
